

MANDATE OF WSTF

 To assist in financing the provision of water services to areas of Kenya without adequate water services

OVER VIEW OF WSTF

- Established under the Water Act in Oct 2002
- Operates under a trust deed of April 2004
- Started operations in May 2005
- Incorporated under the trustees Act on 19th Nov 2008
- Has 9 directors including a Chairman appointed by the Minister (currently the Cabinet Secretary)




STRATEGIC OBJECTIVES

- 1. Mobilize resources Ksh 6.5 billion mobilized
 - Ksh 5.1 billion disbursed to projects
- 2. Develop systems Channels funds to communities through three main Programmes
 - a) Urban Project Cycle (UPC) for water and sanitation to the Urban low income areas
 - b) Community Project Cycle (CPC) for water and sanitation to underserved rural areas
 - c) WRUA Development Cycle (WDC) for Water Resource Management in sub-catchment
- 3. Develop & nature partnerships Wide stakeholder base
- 4. Build capacity of WSTF
- 5. Build capacity of Agents












WSTF PROGRAMME FUNDS FLOW




1. Achievements of Urban Project Cycle

- 191 projects funded
 - cost of Ksh. 2,035 Million reaching 1.5 Million people
- UBSUP (Up-scaling Basic Sanitation for the Urban Poor)
 Programme through BMGF and KfW.
 - UBSUP subsidizes basic sanitation and promotes the sanitation value chain.
- Mapping of all low income areas of Kenya through Maji Data (<u>www.majidata.go.ke</u>)
 - Increased Programme Management skills for water utilities
 - Increased revenue collection for WSPs
- Innovations in technology and systems, e.g. low cost kiosks, eco-sanitation solutions etc.

RURAL PROGRAMMES

2. Achievements of Community Project Cycle (CPC)

- 2 Million people reached with water and sanitation
- Total investment of Ksh.1.53 Billion
- Financial support for improved access to water & sanitation to underserved rural communities
- Enhances capacity of communities to apply for and implement their own water and sanitation facilities.
- Access to water of quality and quantity
- More time available for education and economic activities
- Improved health and hygiene
- Development of leadership and governance skills in communities




3. Achievements of Water Resources Users Association (WRUA) Development Cycle (WDC)

- 281 WRUA projects funded
- Total investment of Ksh385 Million.
- WDC is a mechanism for supporting WRUAs to manage their water resources within their sub catchments.
- Improved environment through rehabilitated water catchment areas
- Reduced water related conflicts
- Capacity building to communities


