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Composting toilets – basics, concepts and examples of waterless sanitation

Instead of returning human excreta with all of their nutrients to the natural nutrient cycle of the earth, the usual practice today is to combine and flush excreta with large quantities of valuable water, only to clean the water again later at great cost. The treatment and utilisation of faeces by means of waterless sanitation makes it possible to close the natural cycle again while still meeting modern demands for comfort and hygiene. This book describes in detail the methods and the types of biological dry and composting toilets available on the market, what needs to be considered when installing and using them on a daily basis, and the legal requirements for building integration. It also discusses how to use faecal compost and urine as a hygienically safe fertiliser in gardening and agriculture. A wide range of case studies illustrates the experience gained in the use of dry and composting toilets as an effective alternative to flush toilets, ranging from installations in single-family homes, housing estates and allotment gardens to public buildings and recreational areas.

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
