o Concern over SuSanA's limited impact on decision-

makers and other actors



- Suggestion: position papers, stakeholder outreach, targeted lobbying
- SFD Publications (Suresh):
 - Working on national-level SFD publication (Lancaster University, IWA, Bradford University involved)
- Audience Clarity (Christian):
 - Need to define key audiences and provide clear, synthesized summaries of research on SuSanA
- Thought Leadership (Abishek):
 - SuSanA seen as a major platform and volunteers can produce white papers and collaborative opinion pieces
- Reactivation Post-COVID (Susmita):
 - SuSanA engagement has dropped; suggest curated knowledge collections (e.g. groundwater recharge) and outreach via varied platforms and networking
- Climate Integration (Rajesh):
 - o India's sanitation projects lack climate focus.
 - Recommends developing tools and evidence to guide policy, especially in small towns.

Group 4: Modernizing Knowledge Management and Outreach and Digital Engagement

- Video & Podcast Initiatives:
 - Develop video podcasts and multimedia content to translate research into practical action (Laura and Vivi)
 - Promote circular sanitation via YouTube and multimedia content (Vivi)
 - Create a centralized content hub (Patrick)
- Tech & Al Solutions:
 - Use AI and machine learning to improve database search and automate document creation (Nitya)
- Identified Challenges:
 - o Information overload and complexity limit accessibility
 - Unclear document audiences need clarification
 - Centralized content creation limits collaboration; aim for a more open approach
- Strategic Considerations:
 - Shift from single-organization dominance to collective expert engagement
 - Align content strategy with water-climate linkages
- Possible Future Directions:
 - Blend conventional and sustainable sanitation approaches
 - Use multimedia platforms (podcasts, social media) to enhance engagement

	Group 5: Strategic Governance, Partnership, and Future Visioning • Funding & Financial Stability: • Questions on how navigate the current funding situation • Conference Participation: • In-person event attendance declining due to cost and preference for virtual formats • A shift to localized events and stronger national presence could help to maintain engagement • Strengthening Partnerships: • Seek more alignment to avoid confusion and overlap across organization (Example: IWA Priorities align with SuSanA in Sanitation, post 2030, capacity development or climate) • Scarce funding makes overlapping work sustainable • Strengthen coordination and collaboration with national governments and partners • Knowledge Sharing: • SuSanA Library actively used by WinS to disseminate resources
